The late Patsy O'Brien R.I.P.

One of Carlow's finest ambassadors sadly passed away in Birmingham at the end of April, 2008.

Patsy O'Brien, as many of you know lost her battle with cancer earlier this year, leaving behind her loving daughter, Patsy Collins, and grandson, Matthew. "There's been a hole left in the Community by Patsy's death and it is one that won't be easily filled. She was only four-foot nothing and she packed more into that small frame than anyone else ever could" was just one of the many tributes paid to Patsy at her memorial service.

CCAL too, wants to pay tribute to this "feisty, warm hearted......,spirited woman" who was a well known figure at Carlow London Dinner Dances. President of our Association, Margaret Doyle, says "I knew Patsy from going up to Birmingham and Manchester Dinner Dances and Patsy coming to London. She was always great fun. The heart and soul of the party".

Patsy last came to our Dinner Dance in 2006. Determined to support us and maintain the great links between the Associations, Patsy travelled the round trip by coach over-night. Jim Kehoe, Chairman of the Birmingham Carlow Association still recalls how he and Patsy ran through the streets to catch their coach home.

Patsy was in Birmingham at the time of the pub bombings and her greatest wish was to see the whole community of Birmingham come together. "She played an integral part in bringing the St. Patrick`s Day parade back to Birmingham in 1996 after almost 20 years. (Carlow Nationalist,14 May,2008) Under her care and guidance, the Parade is now one of the largest in the world and her picture even advertised the event this year.(B`ham Mail, 30th April,2008).

Patsy raised tens of thousands of pounds for charities over the years....supporting Acorns, the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, in Edgbaston and Macmillan Cancer Support (B`ham Mail, 30th April, 2008)

Patsy's legacy is her enormous contribution to the Carlow Association in Birmingham of which she was President. Born in Bagenalstown, with which she maintained strong links, Patsy came to Birmingham in 1958 and worked at the Lucas factory, where she was also a shop steward.

Friends paid their last respects at St. Annes Church, Digbeth following a procession led by a piper and dancers, before Patsy was finally taken home to Bagenalstown.

Representatives of CCAL travelled to Birmingham to bid a fond farewell. Patsy will be sadly missed by loving family and friends.

CARLOW ASSOCIATION'S FRIENDS OF CALCUTTA WALK 'A GREAT SUCCESS'

The County Carlow Association of London celebrated their upcoming 40th anniversary by organising a 40-mile sponsored walk in Pembrokeshire, South Wales, over the Irish Bank Holiday Weekend of 31st May / 1st June for The Friends of Calcutta charity.

When poised with the question, 'What has Carlow, London, Pembrokeshire and Calcutta got in common' one would be allowed a certain amount of slack to figure it out, but the Carlow Association connected all together and let their feet do the work as they completed a 40 mile trek in Pembrokeshire for the poor of Calcutta.

Team Leader for the weekend was Ned Dunbar, the Association Treasurer who acted as logistics officer for the project in plotting the route and tackling the accommodation problem for the caravans and vehicles that made their way from London and Carlow for the weekend.

Ned commented:

"It was tough going at times and the walkers were pushed to their limits, younger and older alike but the scenery was more that enough to keep us going. The weather was marvellous and some of us were often mistaken for thinking we were not in Wales at all. The changing views with the blue lagoons and hidden beaches with white water would bring you to believe, you were lost on a Caribbean island."

After the launch party in Haverfordwest on the Friday where members of Pembrokeshire Council greeted the walkers, the stage was set for a 24 miler on Saturday with 16 miles on the Sunday. The walkers taking part were Chairperson of the Association: Claire Nolan-Sturley (Carlow Town), Ned Dunbar (Ardriston), Cecelia Byrne (Garryhill), Anne Nolan (Carlow Town), Bob Monaghan (Bagenalstown), and John Nolan (Bagenalstown). Margaret Doyle, Margaret Monaghan and Noreen Nolan provided the back up support

All monies raised is being pledged to the Friends of Calcutta, the humanitarian charity, founded in 1994 that educates over 1800 children in some of the poorest areas of India. The founder of the charity, Michael Hopkins became Carlow's 2006 International Person of the Year for his dedication and commitment to the poor of Calcutta.

Claire Nolan-Sturley, chair of the Association, explains all:

"At our Dinner Dance last year Michael was our guest of honour. We were so touched by the picture he painted of life in Calcutta it was decided to help Michael's charity by taking on the walk. I must say it is very heart warming to have so much support in London and back at home for the Friends of Calcutta charity. We cannot thank everybody enough for their generous sponsorship.

We opted for a 40-mile walk to coincide with our 40th Annual Dinner Dance on Saturday 11th October. We haven't as yet decided what we'll do next year but I can assure you we'll have something special for our 50th!"

Association President Margaret Doyle summed up the weekend:

'As a great experience, and I'd like to thank all the walkers and supporters that helped make it a huge success. It's great to be part of an organisation that cares for those less fortunate than ourselves'
